THE NAMING OF HEXTALL PARK

The Bowness Historical Society has applied to The City of Calgary to have the unnamed park located adjacent to the John Hextall Bridge on the Bowness side of the Bow River named "John Hextall Park". An application has been sent to the City's Names Committee, which will review the same within the next month. Should the Committee recommend approval of the name, the BHS will provide further documents showing community support for this proposed name. Following submission of the further documents, the proposed name will be considered for approval by Council Committee and City Council.

The application could come before City Council for approval some time before the end of 2012. We will keep you posted on the progress of this project. The support of Bowness Historical Society members and Bowness residents is critical to the success of this initiative. John Hextall was Bowness' first citizen, who brought the Hextall Bridge, Bowness Park and the street railway to Bowness in the early 1900s. THE SOLDIERS' SETTLEMENT – "VLA"

This issue of the newsletter recognizes the residents of the "Soldiers' Settlement area of Bowness, an early part of Bowness developed in 1946 under the Veterans' Land Act (VLA). 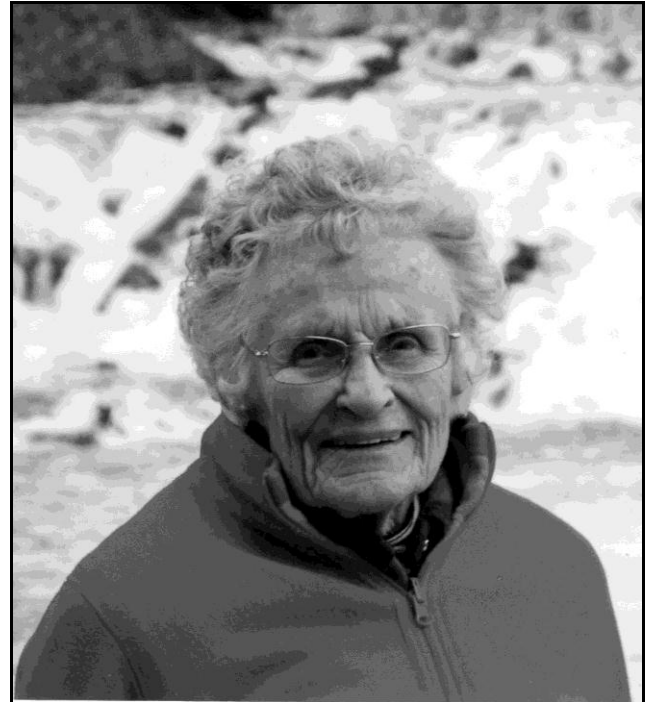
Betty Everett

This is the note that Betty wrote for the Bowness Beacon - "I arrived in Bowness as a war bride with my husband Doug and two sons, Tony and Richard in 1946. We bought a house in the Soldiers' Settlement.

Spent many wonderful years there. We were like one big family - 48 of us. We raised three more boys Don, Bob and Bruce.. All went to school in Bowness. Sadly, Doug passed away in 1972 after we had moved to Calgary in 1968. I am now 91 years and still very active. I enjoy belonging to the Bowness Seniors Centre and the Bowness Historical Society. Although I live in Calgary, my most wonderful memories are the years I spent in Bowness. Hello to my old friends who are still left."

Betty and Bruce Ross purchased their home for \$5,500, one of the 46 homes the government built in the Soldiers' Settlement in Bowness, in 1946. Betty says, "We developed many great lasting friendships with our neighbors. We had fun evenings together with all the neighbors over the years. We couldn't have found a better place to live and raise our families."

The McIntyres moved to the Soldiers' Settlement in the early 1960s from another area in Bowness. Their neighbors were Eleanor Geddes, Roy and Betty Bee, the Howes and the Birds. The one thing that Vida really appreciated about living there was the nice soft water she had before the City of Calgary annexed the Town of Bowness.

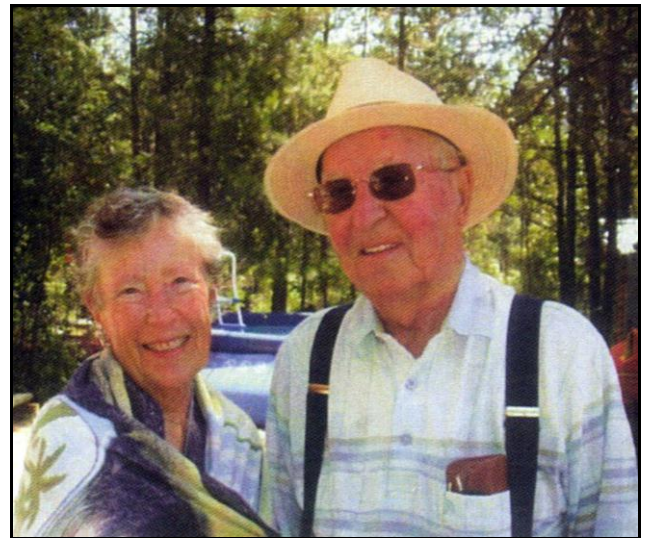
Ted and Jean Sinclair

Ted and Jean Sinclair moved to the VLA on May 24, 1946. Their neighbors were Harold and Helen Leclaire, Doug and Betty Everett, Jerry and Rosemary Ellison, and Mr. and Mrs. McArthur. In Ted's recent letter to the Bowness Historical Society, on living in the Soldiers' Settlement, he recalled, "I have spent hours looking at pictures and places and homes as they changed over the years. It was a wonderful time and place to have had our families born and raised. Our children and grandchildren will have many

memories of that time as they read the book.” Ted and Jean left Bowness in 2010 and moved to Vulcan. Sadly, Jean passed away on July 21, 2012.

Nick, age 87, and Ethel (Val), age 86, Olenick lived in the Soldiers’ Settlement from 1957 to 1972. In their family history, daughter Dianne recalls that growing up in Bowness was a truly unique experience and a very stable community with families being neighbors for many years. Nick and Ethel were both very involved in the formation of the Bowness Community Club, built and operated the community skating rink, organized hockey teams and winter carnivals, and formed a teen centre.

Dorothy is the daughter of Frank and Sadie Ainsworth, early settlers in Bowness (1939). Dorothy and Elmer Porter moved to their home in the VLA, after the first owners, the Rogers, moved to Lethbridge in 1953. Dorothy remembers “on Christmas Eve one of the men in the Settlement played Santa Claus, visiting all the homes and leaving a present for every child. On Christmas Day, Charlie Mills brought his horse and sleigh to the settlement giving rides to families up and down Alexander Avenue.”

2012 HISTORIC HOMES TOUR

The Bowness Historical Society hosted the Bowness Historic Homes Walking Tour on July 29, which was well attended by over 60 people. Dr. Judith Barge, Society Director and researcher of the Hextall era, provided a historical commentary of the homes. These homes were constructed by John Hextall 1912-1913, and have retained their original character. The tour started at the Wallace House, where participants of the tour were welcomed and given refreshments. Participants were also allowed to walk around the yard of the Fraser House. The tour ended at the Arnaud/Jackson House (main floor), where participants were provided with refreshments in the garden. This home has been extensively renovated over the last year, but much of the original beams and woodwork is still present.

The Bowness Historical Society thanks our gracious hosts for providing access to their homes. The Society provided the Tour participants with a brochure describing the Hextall homes. The brochure will shortly be displayed on our website (www.bownesshistoricalsociety.com), which is presently being updated. Both Society books provide history and description of the Hextall Homes.

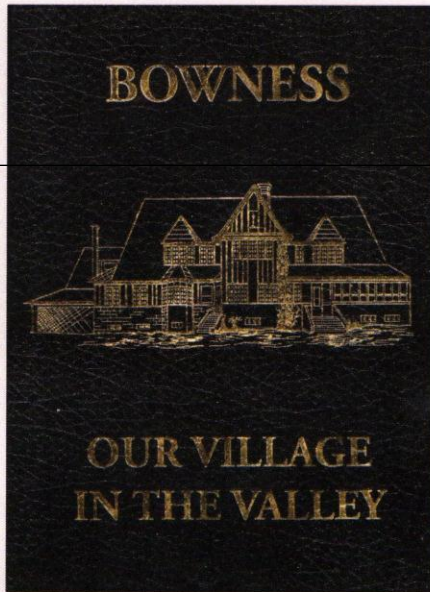

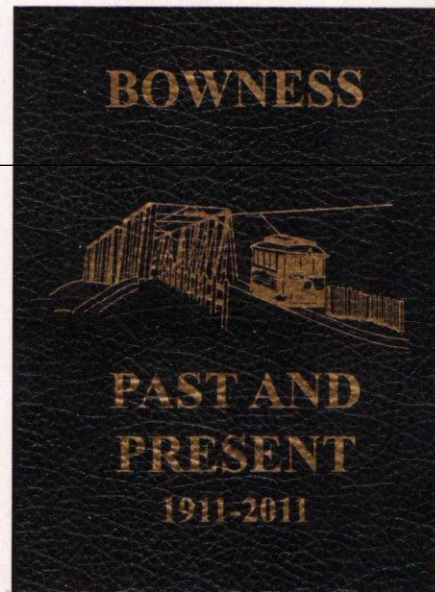
